

Eligibility for Public Dental Services

Summary NSW Health delivers general dental care to eligible individuals via Oral Health Services within Local Health Districts and Specialty Networks. This Policy Directive aims to prioritise services for vulnerable groups and priority populations. Eligibility criteria for adults and children are outlined in this document.

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Eligibility for Public Dental Services

Policy Statement

NSW Health delivers general dental care to eligible individuals via Oral Health Services within Local Health Districts (LHDs) and Specialty Networks. This Policy Directive aims to prioritise services for vulnerable groups and priority populations.

Summary of Policy Requirements

Patients who meet the eligibility criteria can access free general dental treatment from public dental services in NSW subject to the patient prioritisation and waitlisting procedures set out in the NSW Health Policy Directive *Oral Health Access* ([PD2024_034](#)).

For an adult (18 years of age or older) to access public dental services, they must be a resident of NSW, eligible for Medicare and hold, or be listed as a dependent on one of the following valid Australian Government concession cards:

- Health Care Card
- Pensioner Concession Card
- Commonwealth Seniors Health Card (not the NSW State Seniors Card).

For a child or young person (under 18 years of age) to access public dental services, they must be a resident of NSW, eligible for Medicare and their parent/guardian must sign the [Child Dental Benefits Schedule](#) (CDBS) Bulk Billing Patient Consent Form. If a child is not eligible for CDBS or has exhausted their CDBS benefit, the parent/guardian is still required to sign the form.

Patients are required to show proof of eligibility and identification on arrival at a public dental clinic.

Adults and young people in custody, may access public dental services through Justice Health and Forensic Mental Health Network or via referral to a Local Health District.

All **Stolen Generations Survivors** are eligible for prioritised access to care by a public dental service when referred by a recognised Stolen Generations Organisation.

Referral pathways may exist between Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisations and Local Health Districts. Eligibility may be extended by the Local Health District Oral Health Director, Manager or delegate.

Exceptions can be made to provide emergency or urgent dental care for people unable to prove eligibility such as **people experiencing homelessness** or **people seeking asylum**.

Public Dental Specialist Services may have different eligibility criteria. Refer to the NSW Health Policy Directive *Oral Health Specialist Referral Protocols* ([PD2011_071](#)) for more information.

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1. Background

1.1. About this document

NSW Health provides general dental services to eligible patients through Local Health District Oral Health Services and Specialty Networks. This Policy Directive ensures that the delivery of dental services are targeted towards priority populations, vulnerable groups, and patients most in need of public oral health care.

The NSW Health Policy Directive *Oral Health Access* ([PD2024_034](#)) outlines how patients are prioritised for dental care to ensure all patients are seen in a timely manner.

Eligibility requirements for specialist services may be different to general dental services. For information on specialist eligibility, refer to the NSW Health Policy Directive *Oral Health Specialist Referral Protocols* ([PD2011_071](#)) and the NSW Health [NSW public dental services](#) website.

1.2. Key definitions

Episodic Course of Care	Limited course of care provided with the intent of only addressing a specific, clinically urgent patient presentation.
Public Dental Services	Publicly funded general and specialist dental services provided through Local Health District Oral Health Services or Specialty Networks.
Stolen Generations	A period in Australia's history where Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children were removed from their families through government policies. This happened from the mid-1800s to the 1970s.

2. Eligibility criteria to access public dental services

Patients who meet the eligibility criteria can access general dental treatment from public dental services in NSW.

2.1. Adults (18 years of age or older)

To be eligible for public dental services, an adult must:

- be a resident of NSW
- be eligible for Medicare, and
- hold, or be listed as a dependent on, one of the following valid Australian Government concession cards:

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- Health Care Card
 - Pensioner Concession Card
 - Commonwealth Seniors Health Card.

Note that holders of the State Seniors Card are not eligible for care unless they also hold one of the other concession cards listed above.

Patients will be requested to show a valid concession card at each visit.

2.2. Children and young people (under 18 years of age)

A child or young person must:

- be a resident of NSW
- be eligible for Medicare, and
- have their parent/guardian sign the Child Dental Benefits Schedule (CDBS) Bulk Billing Patient Consent Form.

If a child is not eligible for CDBS or has exhausted their CDBS benefit, the parent/guardian is still required to sign the form. More information about CDBS is available on the Services Australia [Child Dental Benefits Schedule](#) website and NSW Health [Child Dental Benefits Schedule \(CDBS\)](#) website.

2.3. People in custody

Adults and young people in custody within NSW publicly operated Correctional or Youth Justice Centres, and forensic patients of the Forensic Hospital, may access public dental services through Justice Health and Forensic Mental Health Network or via referral to a Local Health District.

2.4. Stolen Generations Survivors

All Stolen Generations Survivors are eligible for prioritised access to care by a public dental service when referred by a recognised Stolen Generations Organisation. Proof of eligibility is not required.

2.5. Additional arrangements

Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisation (ACCHO) arrangements with Local Health Districts

Where partnerships exist between Oral Health Services and Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisations or Local Health District Aboriginal Health Services, Local Health Districts may extend eligibility at the discretion of the Local Health District Oral Health Director, Manager, or delegate.

Such arrangements must be clearly documented in Service Agreements and/or Program documents.

People outside their Local Health District of residence

Patients will be treated in the Local Health District in which they reside. Eligible patients experiencing a dental emergency or an urgent dental problem as defined by the NSW Health Policy Directive *Oral Health Access* ([PD2024_034](#)) Code 1 or 2, while outside of their Local Health District of residence, must be provided with an episodic course of care where necessary. Appropriate arrangements for follow-up must also be made.

Inter-district arrangements can be considered for patients living near the border of another Local Health District.

3. Proof of eligibility

Local Health Districts require patients to provide proof of eligibility at presentation, including a valid Medicare card and/or concession card. Digital versions via myGov or the Express Plus Medicare mobile app may be accepted.

3.1. Identification documents

Patients are requested to bring identification documents such as:

- Secondary identification – for example, current or recently expired (within 2 years) driver's licence or NSW Photo Card.
- For people experiencing homelessness, a formal letter from a recognised homelessness agency is acceptable.

4. Exceptions

4.1. Asylum Seekers

Patients seeking asylum on humanitarian grounds who are unable to prove eligibility, may be provided an episodic course of emergency or urgent dental care at the discretion of the Local Health District Oral Health Director, Manager or delegate. Further treatment needs may also be considered on a case-by-case basis.

The person must be referred to the Oral Health Service by a recognised agency. Proof of eligibility is not required.

4.2. Patients experiencing homelessness

Patients experiencing homelessness may be provided an episodic course of emergency or urgent care at the discretion of the Local Health District Oral Health Director, Manager or delegate.

People experiencing homelessness can self-refer or provide a formal letter of identification from a recognised homelessness agency.

4.3. Exceptional circumstances

In exceptional cases, an episodic course of care may be provided for patients with a confirmed dental emergency at the discretion of the Local Health District/Specialty Health Network Oral Health Director, Manager or delegate.

5. Inpatients and emergency access

Public hospital inpatients are not automatically eligible for public dental services.

Normal eligibility criteria apply unless the oral health treatment is:

- a confirmed emergency, or
- an essential part of the patient's surgical or medical management.

6. Specialist services

Different eligibility criteria may apply for specialist public dental services. Refer to the NSW Health Policy Directive *Oral Health Specialist Referral Protocols* ([PD2011_071](#)) and NSW Health [NSW public dental services](#) website for more information.
